SUBIC BAY FREEPORT — ALL the garbage brouhaha for the past six years has finally resulted to the return of 69 container vans containing "hazardous" wastes to

"After mounting several creative protest actions... and sending not a few letters and petitions to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and his predecessor since 2014, we are finally reaping the hard-earned fruits of our people's persistent fight for environmental justice," said Aileen Lucero, national coordinator of the

EcoWaste Coalition.

A total of 103 container vans of waste from Canada were discovered in the Port of Manila between 2013-2014, and moved here for storage while the government was in a quandary on what to do with it. However, in 2015, the contents of 26 were Toylor dumped in a

landfill in Capas, Tarlac. Eight (8) container vans have not been accounted for, prompting EcoWaste Coalition to file a Freedom of Information request to the Bureau of Customs (BoC) "to shed light on this matter of public interest." BoC has yet to respond.

The containers were loaded through the night on MV Bavaria which left the Subic Bay Freeport around 7 AM

With the public outrage over the dumping of wastes by other countries on Philippines soil boiling over, President Rodrigo Duterte earlier threatened to "go to war" with Canada if the latter refuses to take back its garbage by May 15, 2019. Canada ignored Duterte's deadline, however, and no war was declared, although he did recall the country's dip-Iomats in Canada.

Local Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) groups, aside from EcoWaste Coalition, including Greenpeace Philippines, Global Alliance for Incinerator Alternatives, BAN Toxics, and the Global Break Free from Plastic Movement, attribute the "victory" to the "concerted effort of the people."

It can be recalled that the late

Senator Miriam Defensor Santiago, herself, was at the forefront of the fight against the dumping of foreign wastes

on Philippines soil.

She raised a howl in 2015 when the government started to dispose the Canadian waste in Tarlac, effectively preventing the dumping of the contents of the remaining container vans there.

Subic Bay Metropolitan Authority (SBMA) Chair & Administrator Wilma T. Eisma says she is relieved that the waste has finally left the Subic Bay Free-

An advocate of "safe & clean environment," Eisma said she would not allow any more similar waste shipments to be stored in the Freeport under her

"My Seaport team is monitoring that all these 69 containers are going up there on the ship which will leave for Canada early in the morning," Eisma assured the media last night.

Recently, more waste shipments to the Philippines have been discovered,

particularly in Mindanao, coming from China, South Korea and Australia.

The government has yet to punish or penalize the people behind the waste imports, as NGOs renew their call for the Philippines to ratify the Basel Convention Ban Amendment that prohibits the transboundary movement of wastes among countries for final dispos-

U.S., Philippines, and Indonesia Enhance Counterterrorism Capabilities



General Santos City, May 30, 2019 Prosecutors, law enforcement officials, and legal experts from the United States, Philippines, and Indonesia came together from May 22 to 23 for a workshop on effective investigations and prosecutions of terrorism cases. The U.S. Embassy in the Philippines, through the U.S. Department of Justice (U.S. DOJ) Office of Overseas Prosecutorial Development Assistance and Training (OPDAT), partnered with the Philippine Department of Justice to train 52 participants from the Justice to train 52 participants from the three countries.

The workshop was an opportunity for counterterrorism officials to share best practices and develop professional networks. Deputy Chief of Mission of the U.S. Embassy in the Philippines John Law told workshop participants, "I hope this is only the beginning of a lasting relationship and cooperation among our three countries in combatting terrorism. Your work will make a difference in glob-

al efforts to combat terrorism."

The workshop introduced participants to a wide range of tools for investigating terrorism, such as digital forensics techniques and cyber investigations, identifying common types of explosives, pre- and post-blast crime scene investi-gation, and coordination between law enforcement and prosecutors in terror-

ism cases Philippine Police Major Ariel Philip Pontillas said, "The workshop es-tablished a good working relationship between the Philippine National Police

and prosecutors in our fight against terrorism.

During the workshop, Commissioner Felizardo Serapio, Jr. of the Philipsioner Felizardo Serapio, Jr. of the Philippine National Police Commission shared the Philippines' perspective on terrorist threats. Acting Prosecutor General of the Philippine Department of Justice Richard Anthony Fadullon presented on investigating and prosecuting terrorism cases, including rules of criminal procedure, cybercrime warrants, and successfully using evidence in prosecutions. Anita Dewayani, prosecutor at the tions. Anita Dewayani, prosecutor at the Indonesian Directorate of Terrorism and Transnational Crimes, discussed Indonesia's experiences prosecuting terrorism

Visiting experts from the United States also delivered presentations. U.S. DOJ National Security Division Counterterrorism Section prosecutor Mary Futcher discussed international perspectives on prosecuting terrorism cases, and U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigations expert John Kowatch spoke about types of explosive devices commonly encountered in the region. Director of the U.S. DOJ Cybercrime Laboratory Ovie Carroll discussed online investigations of terrorism cases, including on social media plat-

There are cases where Parents-Teachers Associations (PTAs) are deputizing teachers to collect such amount from its students.

He said parents or students should report it immediately to them should there be cases like these in their

"Please report to us those who would collect payments or whatever it is that is due to our pupils or students as the Regional Director will file administrative charges immediately after these teachers or principals are reported to us," he said.

YOKOSUKA, Japan (NNS) -- The forward-deployed aircraft-carrier USS Ronald Reagan (CVN 76), along with supporting Commander Task Force 70 units, began underway operations in the Indo-Pacific May 20.

underway operations in the Indo-Pacific May 20.

Ronald Reagan and CTF 70 units routinely operate in the Indo-Pacific to promote a free and open Indo-Pacific region. For over 70 years, U.S. Pacific Fleet forces have been present and ready to respond in the Western Pacific to any contingency on behalf of friends, partners and allies.

"Forward presence truly matters. For more than seventy years, our forces have been present and ready to respond immediately on behalf of our friends and allies," said Rear Adm. Karl Thomas, CTF 70. "The continued presence of Ronald Reagan and all our forward-deployed forces in the Indo-Pacific region, at sea where it matters most, promote security and stability which in turn drive peace and prosperity to benefit all regional countries."

Throughout the year, CTF 70's forward-deployed forces participate in cooperative deployments, multi-lateral exercises and unit level training to ensure the security and stability of the Indo-Pacific. Forward-deployed forces act as force multipliers for the Navy, which are able to generate the same presence in a matter

of days with a forward-deployed ship that would take weeks to achieve from a U.S. based ship.

"Reagan Sailors worked hard to complete the most successful maintenance period the ship has ever seen," said Capt. Pat Hannifin, Ronald Reagan's Commanding Officer. "Reagan returns to the sea more lethal than ever, visibly renewing U.S. commitment to international norms in a free and open Indo-Pacific. We value our allies and partners in the region and are excited to support them again with our air wing and strike group from the sea." the sea.

Ronald Reagan recently completed an extensive maintenance period which repaired and upgraded ship's systems increasing the ship's warfighting capabilities. "The Kabalikat sa Kabuhayan is a big help to our farmers for them to have a big production of vegetables and different variety of crops. From the start of planting up to selling, our partner SM Foundation will help us," City Agriculturist Nerissa Mateo said.

Pamintuan said the road devel-

opment will be divided into three stages that include the construction of the connecting road from the Angeles-Magalang Bridge to the Abacan Loop and Balibago

"The project is eyed to decongest the traffic situation at the Pandan-Pulung Maragul-Magalang Area as it will connect the East (Pulung Maragul) and West (Anunas-Friendship) portions of the city via Abacan Riverbank," he said. He said the highest will also fea-
