

Infected Meat from China seized in Subic port

SUBIC BAY FREEPORT — A reefer van full of meat products suspected of being infected with the dreaded African Swine Fever (ASF) virus arrived here from China but was immediately seized by Port authorities recently, the Subic Bay Metropolitan Authority (SBMA) announced today.

"It was immediately flagged by the quarantine officer from the Department of Agriculture, and then the Bureau of Customs confiscated the shipment," said SBMA Chairman Wilma T. Eisma, adding that the shipment was from Guangzhou, China, one of several countries tagged to have ASF virus infestations that could wreak havoc on the livestock industry.

Valued at some P600,000, the meat products contained in 2,385 packages listed as "food items" were consigned to a trading corporation based in Makati City.

Eisma said the confiscated meat will be immediately destroyed as rec-

Eisma said the confiscated meat will be immediately destroyed, as recommended by the Bureau of Quarantine Services, with the Bureau of Animal Industry disposing of it at the expense of the consignee.

She said the Port of Subic has been on the lookout for pork products after the government called for strict monitoring in all ports to prevent the entry into the country of pork products contaminated with ASF.

According to Jerome Martinez, manager of the SBMA Seaport Department, the Chinese meat products were shipped in refrigerated or reefer van aboard MV Hansa Altenburg, a container ship that arrived in Subic on May 27.

Martinez said the meat shipment had a dutiable value of P591,817.90. He added that the confiscated meat will be injected with chemicals and then buried underground.

The World Organization for Animal health (OIE) has declared ASF to be a highly-contagious hemorrhagic viral disease affecting domestic and wild pigs.
Experts say that while ASF and classical swine fever (CSF) may have similar signs, the ASF virus is unrelated to the CSF virus.
The Food and Drug Administration

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) last week ordered the recall and seizure of imported pork meat products from countries suspected to be affected by the

These are China, Hungary, Latvia, Poland, Romania, Russia, Ukraine, Vietnam, Zambia, South Africa, Czech Republic, Bulgaria, Cambodia, Mongolia, Moldova, and Belgium.

Last week, 69 of 103 container vans containing hazardous wastes were finally shipped out from here back to Canada after six years of heated public protests

Learning spaces of displaced Pampanga Aeta students

CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, Pampanga --The provincial government of Pampanga has allotted some PHP5 million for the construction of temporary learning spac-

es for earthquake victims in the province.
Dr. Leonardo Zapanta, Pampanga School Division Superintendent of the Department of Education (DepEd), said the provincial school board chaired by Governor Lilia Pineda has already approved the budget solely intended for proved the budget solely intended for the Aeta students in Porac and Floridablanca towns.

"The budget was already approved. Construction will be done as soon as possible. For the meantime, makeshift classrooms are being used to accommodate more than 700 students," said Zapanta in an interview at radio sta-

tion RW 95.1 FM Monday.

Pineda said she asked the local government units (LGUs) of Porac and Floridablanca to coordinate with the provincial government to address the problems of the affected Aeta students.

"Education is one of our top priorities in the province. That's why, I'm asking the local officials of Porac and Floridablanca to work with the provincial government so as to expedite the relocation of our displaced Aeta students," she

Meanwhile, Pineda encouraged concerned LGUs to utilize the use of covered courts, convents, and multi-purpose halls as alternative learning spaces, while still waiting for the construction of the temporary learning spaces for the quake victims.

Last April 22, Porac and Floridablanca towns were among the areas adversely affected by the 6.1 magnitude quake that jolted Pampanga and the whole of Central Luzon.

Based on the assessment conducted by the Department of Environ

Based on the assessment conducted by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources' Mines and Geosciences Bureau (MGB), two upland areas in these towns were placed under a "no habitation zone".

Noel Lacadin, chief of the geo-sciences division of MGB 3 (Central Luzon) here, earlier said Sitio Tagak, Barangay Nabuclod in Floridablanca town, and Barangay Dias in Porac town were placed under a "no habitation zone" due to their "high susceptibility" to landslides.

These areas are hosts to Aeta settlements and their ancestral lands.

Siargao Island gets greener

Siargao island in Surigao del Norte has been known for its pristine white beaches, marine life, rich mangrove forests, and world-class surfing spots.

With tourist arrivals expected to hit around half a million in 2019, the island's leaders have started the path to sustainability. In 2018, the municipality of Pilar passed an ordinance banning the use of single-use plastics — a pioneering move for the island whose biggest industry depends on its rich natural resources.

The island's power distributor, Siargao Electric Cooperative (SIARELCO), pushed the sustainability envelope even further. The island, which was rated one of the world's best in 2018 by prestigious travel magazine Condé Nast Traveler, is now mostly powered by clean and renewable energy.

"Siargao is one of the top tourist"

now mostly powered by clean and renewable energy.

"Siargao is one of the top tourist destinations. While we welcome more guests, local and foreign alike, we wanted to ensure that we continue to do our part in taking care of our island," SIARELCO General Manager Sergio C. Dagooc said.

SIARELCO's demand for power has almost tripled in only three years to an estimated 8 to 9 MW this year. Ma-



jority of the island's supply come from the Private Sector Assets and Liabilities Management (PSALM) which is powered by the Agus-Pulangi hydro power com-plex and the Mt. Apo geothermal power

plex and the Mt. Apo geothermal power plants.

It recently added at least 1 MW from AboitizPower's Hedcor hydro power plant in Bukidnon, under the company's Cleanergy brand.

"After the ban on single-use plastics on the island last year led by our local government, we take pride in contributing our sustainability efforts for Siargao by adding more renewable energy to our energy supply mix," added Dagooc, an incoming party-list congressman representing the Association of Philippine Electric Cooperatives (APEC).

SIARELCO entered into a renewable energy supply contract with Aboitiz-Power subsidiary Hedcor for 1-MW. The energy will come from the company's recently completed hydropower plant in Manolo Fortich, Bukidnon.

"We are excited to be a partner of SIARELCO in its efforts to make Siargao more sustainable. This partnership highlights the high value that both SIARELCO and AboitizPower place on sustainability, driven by our shared commitment to bettering the communities we serve." AboitizPower First Vice President for Energy Trading and Sales Juan Alejandro Aboitiz said.

MGB to monitor loosening rocks atop Mt. Arayat

CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, Pampanga -- Governor Lilia Pineda hás asked the Mines and Geosciences Bureau of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (MGB-DENR) to closely monitor and conduct regular ground assessment on the reported loosening of rocks on top of Mt. Arayat which might cascade anytime.

Pinéda, in her discussion with MGB-3 chief geologist Noel Lacadin, said the move aims to ensure the safe-ty and protection of the residents of Purok 6 and 7 in Barangay San Juan Baño in Arayat town and Barangay Takwi in Magalang town, the two nearest areas

where the rocks might go down.

"I want the residents to be safe from any disaster that is why, I want MGB to conduct regular ground assessment so that we could plan ahead and implement immediate measures before the occurrence of any disaster," the governor said Sunday.

Lacadin said following the ground assessment they made, the rocks might fall via the active channels of Maeyagas, Takwi, Madalumdum, and Oliva creeks.

It can be recalled that the Arayat local government unit (LGU) led by Mayor Emmanuel 'Bon' Alejandrino has built a deflector -- a row of sandbags placed along the path to slow down the flow of water and rocks going to Purok 6 and 7 of Barangay San Juan Baño.

In an interview with Alejandrino, he said sandbagging is just a palliative measure and what is needed is an engineering intervention that would last long to avoid any untoward incidents in the

Meanwhile, the governor has instructed Alejandrino to conduct a pre-emptive evacuation and move the residents to an evacuation center built by the provincial government behind the town hall during the rainy season. (PNA)


